
Education

Awards and Scholarships (Continued)

Distinguished Fellow Awards

The Distinguished Fellow Awards Program recognizes clinical and research fellows who are in rheumatology fellowship training programs and who have performed meritoriously. Recipients of these awards are honored at the ACR annual meeting.

Amgen Pediatric Rheumatology Research Award

The ACR REF/Amgen Pediatric Rheumatology Research Award recognizes and promotes scholarship in the field of pediatric rheumatology. Candidates for the award must be trainees enrolled in recognized ACGME-accredited pediatric rheumatology programs or a related research laboratories, and must be preparing for a career in pediatric rheumatology.

Clinical Investigator Fellowship Award

The ACR REF Clinical Investigator Fellowship Award provides a structured, formal, clinical research training program for rheumatology fellows or rheumatologists in the early stages of their career. This award is meant to support epidemiology, outcome-based research or direct patient-oriented research. Through this award, the REF provides a means for ensuring more qualified, highly-trained clinical investigators in the field of rheumatology.

Physician Scientist Development Award

The ACR REF Physician Scientist Development Award encourages qualified physicians without significant prior research experience to embark on careers in biomedical and/or clinical research in arthritis and rheumatic diseases. This mentored post-doctoral fellowship program provides salary support for the early years of research training in an environment that includes the active participation of established arthritis investigators and an affiliation with a clinical unit involved in the care of arthritis.

Political Advocacy

The ACR advocates on behalf of its members in two key areas: political advocacy and practice advocacy.

Political advocacy includes the activities of the Government Affairs Committee and RheumPAC, the ACR's political action committee. The GAC acts on behalf of the rheumatology community by monitoring and advocating for pending and proposed legislation that would impact ACR members and patients. Advocacy activities include: developing legislative "Issue Briefs" that inform the ACR membership about specific legislation, publishing the Public Policy Monitor, a monthly policy newsletter, and maintaining a "legislative tracking sheet" for each session of Congress.

ACR's Grassroots Action Center offers several ways for members to become involved. Members are encouraged to contact members of Congress, join the advocacy list serve, and participate in the "Advocates for Arthritis" conference, the annual congressional fly-in. RheumPAC allows the ACR to offer financial support to candidates who promote the interest and needs of rheumatologists and rheumatic diseases in the political process.

Practice advocacy describes the activities the College pursues with other bodies, such as insurance carriers and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, to ensure that rheumatology care is properly valued. The ACR also maintains a seat in the American Medical Association House of Delegates.
